

'Grampíans Gallívant' Tour Report - 2023



Friday 27th - Monday 30th October

During the last weekend in October, a cheerful group of 25 Alfisti spent four fantastic days touring the Grampians and Western Victoria in their Alfa Romeos. The *Grampians Gallivant* is an annual event organised by the Goldfields Chapter of AROCA (Vic).

After last year's mammoth 13-day Spring Alfa Tour covering parts of SA as well as Victoria, this year's tour seemed quite short by comparison. Yet it was still a lot of fun with a great bunch of keen Alfisti, enjoying the wonderful country scenery, driving many delightful backroads, and dining at several fine restaurants in the region. A nice way to spend a few days. It was also a welcome change to have fine sunny weather all tour after last year's extremely heavy rain closed many planned routes.

The 2023 touring party included a few interstate participants: Greg & Penelope drove all the way from Perth - an impressive 3,500km cruise, just to start our *Grampians Gallivant* Tour. Then we had Graham & Carole, and Jim & Christine joining us from South Australia. The rest of the group were from various points around Victoria.

The convoy consisted of 14 Alfas plus one 'contrary' 2012 Black Porsche 911 Carrera S. Among the Alfas was the 'well known' 1961 Blue 101 Series Giulietta ti that is owned by Marie & Vin. Also attending were a few nice 105 series coupés, plus some early 2000s GTs, a 159 2.4 Diesel, a Giulietta, a 147 GTA, and the 156 GTA from WA, together with a recent Giulia Veloce through to three 'sparkly & sedate' late model Giulia QV's.

Thursday: A few travellers arrived in Ballarat on Thursday afternoon and had a 'Pre-Tour' dinner at the Oscars Hotel to catch up.

Day 1 Friday: The Tour started in earnest with breakfast at The Turret Café, before this initial convoy of seven Alfas did a lap of Lake Wendouree and stopped for a quick stroll through the Ballarat Botanical Gardens. Then it was onto a visit of the iconic 'Arch of Victory' and the 'Grieving Mother' memorial statue before heading off towards the West, driving along the historic treelined 'Avenue of Honour'. This is a memorial for every Ballarat Soldier who enlisted in WW1 consisting of 3,912 trees and extends for over 22 kilometres).

Centenary of Alfa Romeo's Quadrifoglio

It is one hundred years since Ugo Sivocci, along with Ascari, Campari & Ferrari, first raced with a painted green four-leaf clover (Quadrifoglio Verde) on the bonnet of their RLTFs. It was the 1923 Targa Florio race and Sivocci won that race! Since then, performance focussed Alfa Romeos have all been adorned with a *Quadrifoglio Verde* badge, though the design changed from a diamond background to the now common triangular one, after the unfortunate demise of Sivocci at Monza later that same year.



Andrew made the comment that the four stages of the Grampians Gallivant, 'sort of' resembled a Quadrifoglio pattern on the map (We like Alfisti that can think outside the square!).

So perhaps this year's event should have instead been named the "*Tour Anniversario del Quadrifoglio*" to honour the 100 years of Alfa's iconic Quadrifoglio badge.
